Crystal methamphetamine









- Crystal methamphetamine ('ice'), is a stimulant drug
- Variant of methamphetamine and often a purer form which leads to more serious side effects, and greater risk of dependence




















Crystal is now the most prevalent form of methamphetamine in Australia

What are the trends?










Use and impact is high in regional and remote areas

Impact on families











- Increased anxiety and concerns
- Often neglect their own needs and develop mental health issues of their own
- Experience the stigma and shame of a loved one's use of drugs


Perceptions of selected drugs among people aged 14 and over (%) National Drug Strategy Household Survey 2019

% rated as drug of most concern to the community







RECOMMENDATIONS

Support families, communities and frontline workers

Recommendation 1

The Commonwealth, state and territory governments should work together to develop an online curated toolkit of information and resources to support families and communities to better understand and respond to the problems caused by ice.





Cracks in the Ice











Targeted information and resources for:

- ✓ Community members
- ✓ Families and friends
- ✓ People who use ice
- ✓ Health workers
- ✓ Schools





Further development





- Led by an Expert Advisory Group
- National resource developed in consultation with communities across Australia
- Input from 240 Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people through focus groups and online beta-testing



How was it developed?



Initial Community consultation











Aims:

- Identify the questions Aboriginal & Torres Strait Islander community members have regarding crystal methamphetamine and its harms.
- Find out what should be included on the website to address these questions and how this could best be presented.



What did the focus groups say?









- Key topics: Facts about crystal methamphetamine, prevalence, signs a person may be using the drug.
- Provide locally based support services and information on the treatment pathways.
- Focus on creating a narrative of empathy and breaking down stigma



Harms to those who use 'ice'.



Availability & accessibility of support services



Impact on families and communities





Phase 2: Development









Based on feedback from the focus groups:

- Developed resources including animations, fact pages and hard copy resources.
- Unique interactive features were built, and special graphics were designed
- The community were then asked to provide feedback on these resources.





Beta Testing









- Participants tested site content, and provided feedback through a survey
- Total participants = 116 people
- 73 Aboriginal and/or Torres Strait Islander peoples participated.
- 92% of participants selected that it was clear what information they can get from Cracks in the ice.



Beta Testing





Fact pages most likely to be read were:

- 'What to do if someone won't seek support' (75%)
- 'Concerned about someone using ice' (64%)



Beta Testing







"Perhaps more than one brochure could be developed as this is covering a lot of different areas..."

 86% of health workers said the information page would be helpful for them when looking for resources about ice.





Introduction to website



Printed hard copy resources











- Developed as companions to the online toolkit.
- Aim to summarise key information from the Cracks in the Ice
- Free resources which can be ordered and delivered anywhere in Australia (at no cost)
- Electronic versions downloadable online
