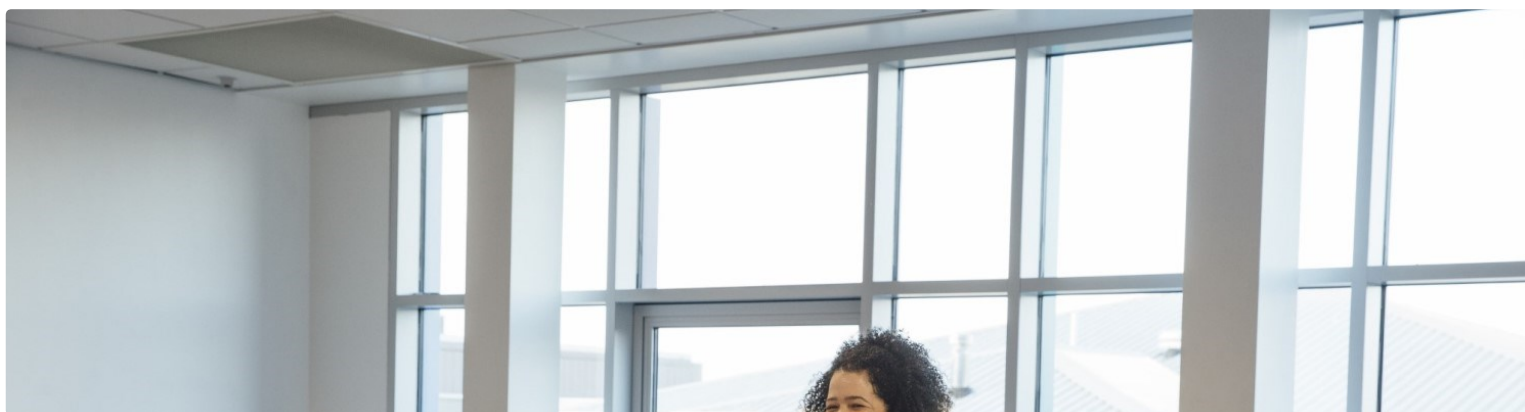


School-based drug prevention: What works? A guide for teachers
